

Maryland Opioid Crisis Funding Breakdown by Jurisdiction (fy2018-fy2019)

This document is intended to help improve understanding of Opioid Crisis Funding directed to Maryland jurisdictions. The document provides a breakdown of state and federal opioid crisis funds by jurisdiction. This breakdown includes funds awarded to local government agencies and other partner organizations in each community.
