IV. ORF Grant Timeline & Recommendations

Presented by Emily Keller, OOC Special Secretary of Opioid Response

- From the debrief, poll, and community input from written and verbal the council will come up with recommendations that align with 2022 HB794 on or before November 1 each year, per the legislation.

Grant Process & Proposed Timeline for the OOC to Distribute Funding

- If the Advisory Council could provide guidance for funding in May of this year below are the steps that could come after to provide funding.
- Targeted Abatement Notice Released on June 1st 2023
- Application Period June 1st - July 14th 2023
- OOC Review Period July 14th - August 25th 2023
- The OOC would review projects to ensure they fall within requirements of the legislation. Given the larger budgets and amounts of awards (58), this period is extended to 30 working days.
- The OOC would issue award letters and grant agreements August 25th - September 1st 2023.
- This totals a timeline of 66 working days from announcement to project commencement. If the advisory council can provide recommendations in the next two months we can begin distributing funds in September.

Overview from 2021 Statewide Spending by Priority Area

- In 2021, \$904,826,213 was the total amount spent on resources for substance use disorder.
 - About 54% was federal and 40% was state funded
- Largest line item to Expand Access to Evidence-Based Treatment for Opioid Use Disorder \$774,818,319
- About \$226,000,000 of medicaid reimbursement for community based service for substance use disorder
- Second largest line item to Improve Statewide Infrastructure for Opioid Initiatives - \$110,002,484
 - About \$78,000,000 to support state police, on investigations, ems services to responding to overdoses.

- Opioid Related Funding - Top 3 priorities by public poll
 1. Treatment - 86% Funding
 2. Recovery Resources - 1% Funding
 3. Care Coordination - 0.2% Funding

ORF Funding Streams (Jensen Settlement) Recap Year 1&2

- 15% to State Allocation for distribution by the State (15% of all annual payments)
 - \$11,258,774.86 in year 1 & 2
- 15% State Discretionary Abatement Fund for distribution via a competitive grant program
 - \$11,258,774.81 per year 1 & 2 payment schedule
- 45% Targeted Abatement Grants for distribution to local abatement funds
 - Represented by the \$24,372,211.51 (\$10,208,058.98 & \$14,164,152.53) in the year 1+2 payment schedule
- 25% Local Allocation to Subdivision Called “Base” funding in the State Subdivision Agreement - allocated to subdivisions based on the Subdivision Allocation Percentage. These will not touch the ORF. \$13,540,117.51
- Total Allocated to ORF Years 1&2 \$46,889,761.23
- Total Year 1&2 Payments \$60,429,878.75
- Anticipating to receive Y3 payments 18,900,000 by the end of the year.

- Kristin Thomas asked if subcommittees will meet privately but decision making will take place at public meetings. Tiffinee - Yes, that is what will happen.
- Harriet requested a link of the Hogan Administration priorities.
- Lauren Levy recommended during listening sessions going to specific jurisdictions and having the Special Secretary present percentages and number of investments. Asked if this is something that we are doing as a

council or in subcommittees? Do we have oversight and accountability?
Tiffinee confirmed the oversight and accountability was written in by legislation. Council has the right to make recommendations to allocations in the main meeting and the council can take votes.
